OVERVIEW

This program guide provides Chaplaincy students with the resources they need to *successfully* complete their programs, transfer to other seminary programs, or seek transfer to other institutions.

Option 1

Students may choose to finish their programs within a designated period of time. They are given until Spring 2023–2024 to finish their Chaplaincy Core courses and take the remaining credits after Spring 2023–2024.

Option 2

Students may transfer to other seminary programs at Grace School of Theology. The Academic Affairs Department will provide proper assistance to expedite the completion of their programs.

Option 3

Students may opt to transfer to other institutions to complete their degrees. Grace School of Theology will provide proper assistance in expediting their transfer credentials.

Graduate Chaplaincy Programs

Introduction to the Program

The Chaplain Focused Programs at Grace provide graduate-level, biblical and practical theological instruction, aimed at providing a solid foundation in Chaplaincy and equipping servant leaders for military, public safety, community and hospital-based chaplaincy. It is designed with an integrative approach that contextualizes both skills-based and issue-based training to the environment of service and adult student-centered active learning pedagogy.

Program design considerations include activity-based learning that is relevant to the student and subject matter, taking the student from what they know to what they do not know and from simple to complex, utilizing activities that are designed to aid them in experientially discovering knowledge and beliefs and modeled by experts within the context of service of Chaplaincy.

Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE)

Students enrolled in the Master of Arts in Chaplaincy (MAC) or in the Master of Arts in Military Chaplaincy (MAMC) are required to complete Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) credits. CPE is not required for those enrolled in the Certificate in Chaplaincy (CC).

CPE is an action/reflection/action inductive method of learning. It is about change, transition and transformation and involves peer and individual supervision as part of the action-reflection process. Supervision is an engaging encounter between a supervisor and supervisees in which reflection is utilized to review a variety of pastoral encounters and ministry reporting events. Supervisees covenant together so that growth and development occur in self-awareness, ministry competence, and theological understanding.

Grace School of Theology is pleased to partner with Clinical Pastoral Education International (CPEI) who provides exceptional supervised clinical pastoral education for those interested in chaplaincy and pastoral care ministries. The CPE Supervisors providing the supervised clinical training are highly qualified with years of experience in various chaplaincy ministries as well as additional training in pastoral supervision. Students who need to complete CPE units but do not need to seek a degree with Grace, may enroll as a Special Status Student. Master of Arts in Chaplaincy (MAC)

The Masters of Arts in Chaplaincy (46 credits) at Grace offers graduate-level instruction aimed at providing a solid foundation in Chaplaincy. It is designed with a focus on equipping those within a broad spectrum of Chaplain service, such as those involved with community (faith-based) or public safety roles.

The degree typically takes a little over two years to complete (if attending full time) and is uniquely structured to provide an overview of the contextualized environment and culture of secular support roles of chaplaincy, and the issues that arise within these environments. The program is a stair-step degree for those who desire to continue their studies into the Master of Arts in Military Chaplaincy (MAMC). Students may transfer up to 23 credits into the MAC from another accredited graduate institution. Students who have completed a BABS may receive up to 12 credits of Advanced Standing. CPE course work level depends on prior CPE work completed.

Master of Arts in Military Chaplaincy (MAMC)

The Masters of Arts in Military Chaplaincy (75 credits) at Grace is designed to provide advanced preparation for service as a military chaplain. This program fulfills the Department of Defense 1304.28 educational requirements for Military Chaplaincy. Grace's MAMC offers not only a solid core of studies focused on preparing the student-chaplain, but offers as well as strong foundation of preparing the student for the pulpit ministry as an effective chaplain. An offering of systematic theology, Bible exposition, biblical hermeneutics and ministry skills coursework will prepare the chaplain candidate to enter military service with a well-balanced preparation to be a servant-leader.

The degree typically takes a little over three years to complete (if attending full time) and is uniquely structured to the issues that arise within the military environment. Students may transfer up to 37 credits into the MAMC from another accredited graduate institution. Students who have completed a BABS may receive up to 18 credits of Advanced Standing. CPE course work level depends on prior CPE work completed.

Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE)

Students enrolled and seeking Chaplaincy Degree Programs are **required** to complete a minimum of 1-2 courses in Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) credits.

The student's CPE course level depends on prior CPE work completed and chosen degree path. Each level of CPE consists of 16 weeks with a total of 400 required hours of which 100 hours of required classroom/ self-study and 300 hours of supervised clinical practice.

Clinical Pastoral Education are "capstone courses" taken toward the end of your degree path in both the undergraduate and graduate degree programs. CPE combines the knowledge acquired in other course work into a supervised clinical practicum over the 16 weeks.

During the semester **prior** to enrolling in CPE coursework, an application and interview process for entrance into the program is a pre-requisite (required). The application is located at <https://www.gsot.edu/student-forms/>.

Students are **required to be in class** (online) during weekly sessions. There are no pre-recorded sessions.

Students who successfully complete each CPE course will receive a Certificate of Completion for each level of CPE achieved after all CPE internship hours and cohort course work has been completed. CPEI sets the standards for the CPE courses and validates the quality of the course work and experiential expertise of our instructors. Upon enrollment in the course a fee of \$50 will be assessed by the Grace Bursar and will automatically be enrolled in CPEI as a Student Member.

The CPE Supervisors providing the supervised clinical training are highly qualified with years of experience in various chaplaincy ministries as well as additional training in pastoral supervision. Students who need to complete CPE units but do not need to seek a degree with Grace, may enroll as a Special Status Student. Students enrolled and seeking Chaplaincy Degree Programs are **required** to complete a minimum of 1-2 courses in Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) credits. [Master of Arts in Chaplaincy requires 4 courses of CPE after which students may apply for national board certification with Commission on Accreditation of Pastoral Education (CAPE)]

The student's CPE course level depends on prior CPE work completed and chosen degree path. Each level of CPE consists of 16 weeks with a total of 400 required hours of which 100 hours of required classroom/ self-study and 300 hours of supervised clinical practice.

Clinical Pastoral Education are "capstone courses" taken toward the end of your degree path in both the undergraduate and graduate degree programs. CPE combines the knowledge acquired in other course work into a supervised clinical practicum over the 16 weeks.

During the semester **prior** to enrolling in CPE coursework, an application and interview process for entrance into the program is a pre-requisite (required). The application is located at <https://www.gst.edu/cpe/clinical-forms>.

Students are **required to be in class** (online) during weekly sessions. There are no pre-recorded sessions.

Students who successfully complete each CPE course will receive a Certificate of Completion for each level of CPE achieved after all CPE internship hours and cohort course work has been completed. CPEI sets the standards for the CPE courses and validates the quality of the course work and experiential expertise of our instructors. Upon enrollment in the course a fee of \$50 will be assessed by the Grace Bursar and will automatically be enrolled in CPEI as a Student Member.
